## Ocean Decade Alliance calls for unlocking investment in ocean science for sustainable development

The Ocean Decade Alliance is issuing a Call to Action on the occasion of the 2022 United Nations Ocean Conference in Lisbon, Portugal, to raise awareness for the need to increase investment in ocean science to support sustainable development.

While there have been numerous achievements in ocean science in the past decades, current levels of funding are insufficient to reverse the decline of the state

of the ocean system.

Climate change, unsustainable exploitation of marine resources, pollution, uncoordinated development of the ocean and coastal zone – in the face of increasingly significant threats, the <u>Call to Action</u> affirms the necessity to invest in solutions-oriented science to restore the health of the ocean and achieve sustainable development.

In that regard, the Patrons and institutional members of the Ocean Decade Alliance, which includes Heads of State, governments, leaders of philanthropy and industry, recognize the United Nations Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development 2021-2030 (the 'Ocean Decade') as a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to convene diverse actors to co-design and co-deliver transformative ocean science, from global to local scale.

From robust ocean observation, data and information, the inclusion of Indigenous knowledge, the support to Early Career Ocean Professionals and youth, to setting up comprehensive capacity development and increased ocean literacy, 'the ocean we want' can only be obtained through scaled-up, systematic and sustained financing and investment. Indeed, on average States devote only 1.7% of their national research budgets to ocean science (0.03% to 11.8%, depending on the country), a figure that needs
